

SERVICE TOMORROW WILL HONOR GREEKS

Manning, Athenagoras and Lely Will Join in Prayer for Nation at St. John's

RALLY OF NEWMAN CLUBS

Three Young Persons Will Be Honored—Jewish Institute Elects 3 New Trustees

A special "Service of Intercession in Behalf of War-Stricken Greece" will be held tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine. Addresses will be made by Bishop William T. Manning, the Most Rev. Athenagoras, Archbishop of the Greek Orthodox Church in North and South America, and Nicholas G. Lely, Greek Consul General in New York. Participating in the service will be Metropolitan Theophilus of the Russian Orthodox Church of North and South America, Archbishop Antony Bashir of the Syrian Orthodox Church and the Right Rev. Bishop Bohdan of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church. Representatives of all the other branches of the Eastern Orthodox Church will be present.

The Greek choir will occupy the place of the cathedral choir and sing the hymns and other musical parts. Bishop Manning will offer prayers "especially for the people of Greece in this time of their need, for a true and righteous peace and for the maintenance of justice and human freedom for all mankind." Archbishop Athenagoras will give the blessing.

Will Wear Cardinal's Ring

The favorite Episcopal ring of the late Cardinal Hayes will be worn by the Most Rev. J. Francis A. McIntyre, chancellor of the Archdiocese of New York, at his consecration ceremony in St. Patrick's Cathedral Wednesday morning, Jan. 8, when he will become Auxiliary Bishop of New York.

The Bishop-elect will also wear a pectoral cross and chain presented to Cardinal Hayes by his predecessor, Cardinal Farley. Ring, cross and chain are gifts to Mgr. McIntyre from the Most Rev. Francis J. Spellman, successor to Cardinal Hayes as Archbishop of New York. Invitations to the consecration will be sent by the Bishop-elect to every Archbishop and Bishop in the United States, together with priests and laymen. Some 4,000 invitations will be issued.

Jewish Institute Picks Trustees

Three trustees were elected at a recent meeting of the board of trustees of the Jewish Institute of Religion, held at the school building, 40 West Sixty-eighth Street, it was announced there yesterday. They were Rabbi Morton M. Berman of Temple Isaiah-Israel, Chicago, of the class of 1926; Rabbi Samson A. Shain of the Jewish Community Center, Sunnyside, Queens, class of 1933, and Irving A. Manasher, president of the Central Coal Company, New York.

Starts Army Camp Survey

A survey of the larger Army camps in the country has been started by the National Lutheran Council "to determine the best means of serving the Lutheran men in the Army," it was announced yesterday by the Rev. Dr. Ralph H. Long, executive director of the council. During the next three weeks two Lutheran clergymen will visit most of the camps in the country and "investigate existing resources for serving men on leave and plan cooperation with Lutheran chaplains in the camps."
